What is Together4Safety and how can you be part of it?

Then, it's about how you create the right opportunities to talk about safety within your organisations and with the other organisations that you rely on to ensure safe operations. Make sure to also encourage discussion about safety within teams so they can talk about their oprational challenges. Finally, it's important to talk to yourself as well, yes really - are you mentally and physically ready for whatever task you are doing?

What has the summer season taught us about what "Being Ready" really means?

We have just started the first 4-week cycle of Conversation Aviation - our new weekly videocast and podcast series. The theme for this first cycle is the "Being Ready" part of the Together4Safety Ramp-up Campaign. This looks at these 3 key areas - these are questions that you can ask yourselves as an organisation to see how the Ramp-up is going at a practical level:

- Ensuring that you have the right tools, equipment and infrastructure in place.
- Having enough skilled, training and qualified people who are operationally ready and fit for duty.
- Putting your staff and their wellbeing at the heart of a people centred Ramp-up.

Of course these are easy enough to say but harder to do in practice. This is what the weekly conversations are designed to do. Provide you with some views from others in the industry on what they have learned over the summer season.

For the first 3 weeks of the cycle you will be able to watch, or listen to, a 30 minute discussion with 3 guests from different parts of the industry. They will talk about their operational challenges around a particular topic and offer some practical solutions designed to help people like you who find themselves in the same situation with lots of problems to solve and not enough time. Each episode will be launched at 1300 CEST (11:00 UTC) on a Friday and they will be followed by our online Friday chat from 1400 to 1500. In week 4 we will have a live session with 3 guests to summarise the cycle and have a longer discussion with questions and answers as well. For this first cycle, our live session will take place on 22 October.

There are some really interesting and important topics in this cycle so you'll get lots of useful information to help you through the autumn safely.

- Encouraging people to follow recognised processes, procedures and practices.
- Knowing your risks and mitigating them effectively as part of a resilient management system.
- Setting a culture of trust that encourages reporting and for people to talk openly about safety and wellbeing.

All the latest on Evidence-Based Training

On 29 September, EASA hosted the 2nd of 4 Webinars on Evidence-Based Training. This session was on the subject of grading systems. It started with an explanation of the regulatory framework from EASA's experts Francisco Arenas Alvarino and Ascanio Russo. Frank Steiner from Lufthansa and Ignacio Gallego from Iberia provided presentations about heir experience. The last part of the webinar was a panel discussion and Q&A led by Frederik Mohrmann and Andy Mitchell from the Aircrew Training Policy Group (ATPG).

Runway Condition Reporting and Winter Ops

A reminder that the European Rules supporting the implementation of the Global Reporting Format for Runway Condition Reporting are now in force across Europe. On 10 March EASA held a workshop to support the implementation - you can watch the video from this event and download the presentations and Q&A on the Runway Condition Reporting page on the Air Ops Community Site. You can also find some additional links on this EASA Website News item. As we look towards winter operations it is worth also sharing the Traficom Winter Ops Guide 2020 from the Finnish Authority. They will produce a 2021 update very soon and we will post this as soon as it's available.

Latest update on the project to reduce fire risks

Preventing on-board fires is one of the Key Risk Areas identified in the <u>EASA Annual Safety Review</u>. There are a range of tasks on this topic in the <u>European Plan for Aviation Safety (EPAS)</u>. One of these is the SABATAIR project that is evaluating specific packaging solutions and other operational measures aimed for the safe transportation of both lithium metal and lithium ion batteries on board commercial transport aircraft as cargo. The SABATAIR project is funded by the European Commission and managed by EASA.

A comprehensive risk assessment method has been developed to support operators in using the solutions and measures in their daily operations. You can access the intermediate report on fire tests performed using a chamber representative of an aircraft cargo compartment is provided for information on the <u>EASA web article</u>.

FDM of new safety issues arising from the COVID-19 pandemic

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic EASA has been updating its <u>Safety Issues Report</u>. These changing safety issues also impact your Flight Data Monitoring (FDM) programmes. We recently published the FDM analysis document that was presented at the FDM workshop of EASA SAFE360° – 2021. Access the Report to get more information on the following topics:

Acronym of the Month: CFIT

This month's acronym of the month is CFIT, standing for Controlled Flight into Terrain. Of course, the acronym itself is very well known and thanks to terrain awareness and aleting systems like EGPWS the number of CFIT accidents have reduced considerably over the past 20-30 years. However, that doesn't mean the risk has gone away. It's worth thinking about how you handle this risk, particularly during approach where airfield works might change approach procedures that could impact approach profiles and create extra risk.
